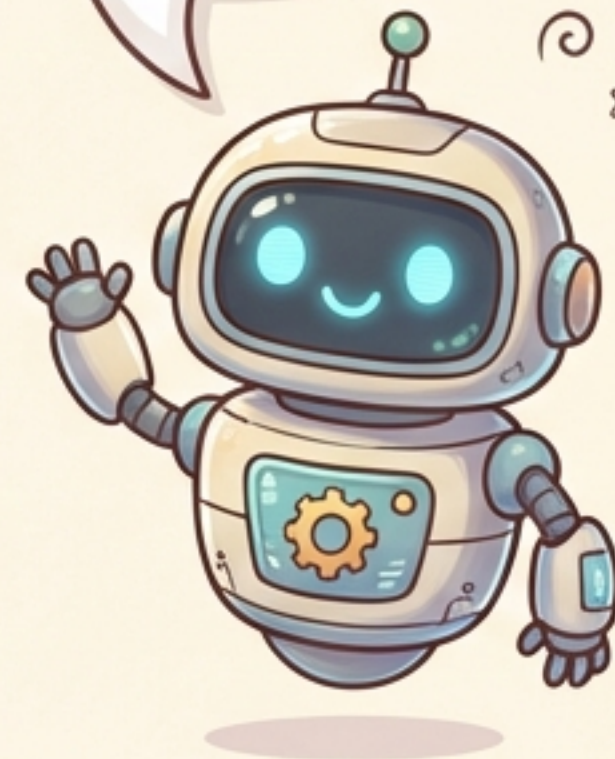

Time Traveler's Guide: Describing Places



One Thing (Singular)

- ✓ There was a parade.
- ✗ There wasn't a band.



Many Things (Plural)



- ✓ There were costumes.
- ✗ There weren't any floats.



Pro Tip: Use “**There was**” for one big thing.
Use “**There were**” for more than one thing!

The Story of the Ocean Float

Let's go back one week before the carnival. A group of friends wanted to build a float. The theme was "Life under the sea".



The children were hard-working.



Alex (the boy in the diver suit) said: "I like my costume!"

Ella said: "It looks amazing!"



The Accident!

The children were almost ready, but it was difficult for Alex to climb onto the float.



- Alex fell. The mess was awful!
- Ella was a good leader. She was calm and kind.
- Alex was very embarrassed (feeling silly and sorry).



A Clever Plan

The Solution: Ella had a plan: 'Everyone go home and bring back

The Feeling: The children were nervous. 'Can we finish in time?'



The Solution: Ella had a plan: 'Everyone go home and bring back rubbish!' They used **recycled bottles and plastic to fix the float.**



The Result: They did it! The 'Our Oceans' float looked fantastic.

How did they feel? (One Person)

When we talk about ONE person, we use **WAS**.



Ella

She was kind.
She was calm.



Alex

He was embarrassed.



The Float

It was beautiful
(before the crash!).

Vocabulary Check:

Embarrassed = When you feel a bit silly or shy because of a mistake.

Hard-working = Working with a lot of energy.

How did they feel? (The Group)

When we talk about MANY people, we use **WERE**.



The Children
They were
hard-working.



The Team
We were nervous
before the parade.



The Friends
They were happy
in the end!
