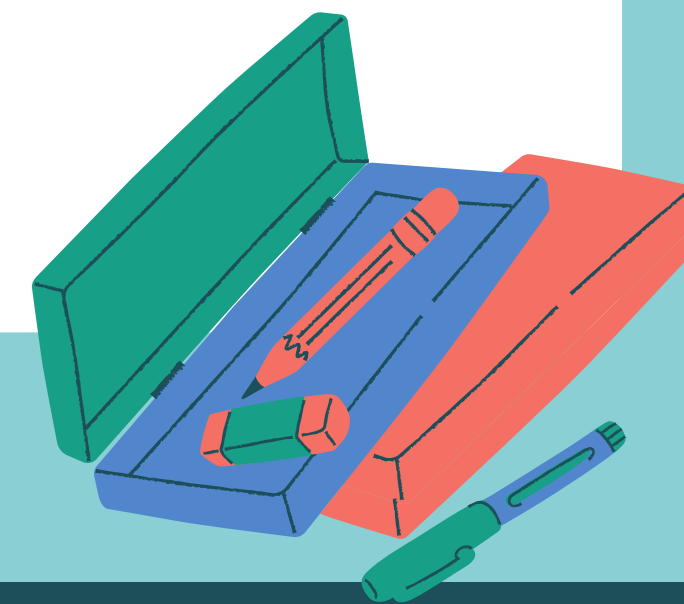
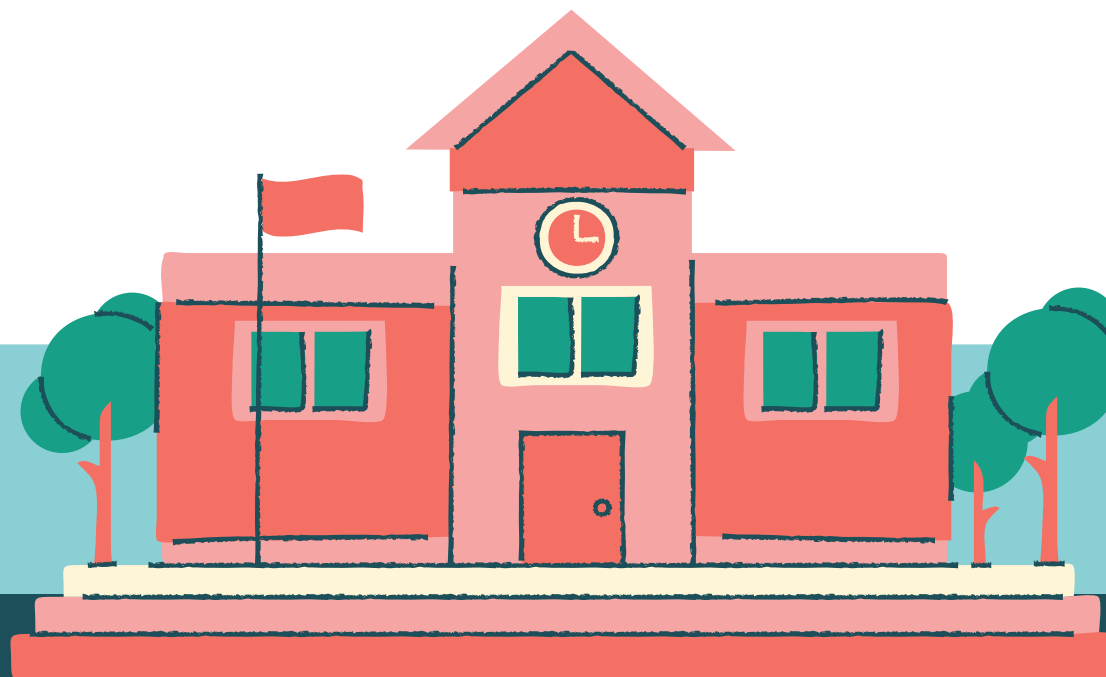


Educational system in Poland



Pre-school education



In Poland pre-school education is offered to children between 3 and 6 years old. 6 year olds are then obliged to attend to a pre-school class for one-year of school preparation.



Primary school



After that, children attend an 8-year primary school, where teaching is divided into two stages:

- grades I-III – early stage during which children are gaining basic, integrated knowledge,
- grades IV-VIII – second stage with subject-based teaching.



High school



Later on pupils can continue their education in one of many types of secondary schools (education is compulsory until the age of 18):

- 4 year general secondary school,
- 5 year technical secondary school,
- 3 year special school preparing for employment,
- 3 year stage I sectoral vocational schools,
- 2 year stage II sectoral vocational schools.





After finishing secondary school students can take the maturity exam which gives them access to higher education. They can also attend to post-secondary schools.



Higher education in Poland is divided on account of types of programmes that are offered to candidates.

There are:



1st cycle programmes

undergraduate studies offered to applicants holding maturity certificate and leading to a degree of a Bachelor

Duration - 3 Years



2nd cycle programmes

graduate studies dedicated to candidates holding a Bachelor's degree and leading to a degree of a Master

Duration - 2 Years



3rd cycle programmes

doctoral studies are open to those who have Master's degree. They provide special knowledge in a specific field of science

Duration - 4 Years



The school year in Poland is divided into 2 terms:
the first/winter term (pierwszy semestr) and the
second/summer term (drugi semestr).

While the first and last days of school are set the same
for all of Poland, the winter break (ferie zimowe) times
differ for each Polish





In our school we have "0" reception class and classes 1-8. Younger students have daily classes with one teacher, besides English and Religious Education. Primary School finishes with exams in Polish, Maths and English.
